# From the Director



# Frequently Asked Questions

## Why should I register for Family Weekend?

Syracuse University's Parents Office and the Division of Student Affairs value the role of parents and families in their students' development. Discussions and bonds that develop from Family Weekend ultimately allow us to better serve all students. Visiting campus on Family Weekend allows you to visit your student, meet his or her friends, and engage with other SU families, senior administrators, faculty, and staff. In addition, you can get a flavor of the local community by visiting the Connective Corridor and local restaurants; and viewing the beautiful fall foliage throughout Central New York.

## Why is there a registration fee for Family Weekend and what is it for?

Toward our goal of maximizing your involvement and participation, there is a registration fee of \$40 per family. Please note that Family Weekend is a self-supporting event—the registration fee is not a direct charge for parking or any specific event, but a means of sharing some of the costs with those attending.

Revenues from this fee apply to many features of both Family Weekend and the overall mission of the Parents Office. Specifically, the fee allows us to provide the following:

- an office devoted solely to meeting the needs and special issues of the parents and/or guardians of our students,
- many “no fee” events and programs;
- classroom discussions with SU's nationally renowned faculty;
- information sessions on topics such as scholarships, on- and off-campus housing, getting involved on campus, and career services;
- free shuttle bus service throughout campus all weekend;
- free admission to the Marilyn and Bill Tenny Ice Skating Pavilion on South Campus;
- memorabilia designed exclusively for Family Weekend;
- a pass to park in a campus parking lot throughout the weekend (North Campus on Friday after 5 p.m. and all day on Sunday, and at the Skytop lot on South Campus on Saturday during the game); and
- an opportunity to help us continuously improve our efforts.

The SU Parents Office thanks you for your attendance and support!

Because SU football games can cause congested streets and limited parking, you will also receive a campus parking permit when you register. The parking permit will allow you to park at the Skytop Lot on South Campus on game day, and at other locations throughout campus after 5 p.m. on Friday, after the game on Saturday, and all day on Sunday.

## How do I register for Family Weekend?

Family Weekend 2009 **registration is available online through October 12, 2009** by using a debit or credit card. Please go to the Parents Office website <http://parents.syr.edu> and click on “Family Weekend Registration.” **Mailed and faxed registration forms will not be accepted.**

**If you have extenuating circumstances** and are unable to register online, please ask your student to stop by our office and complete a registration form for you or contact our office at 315-443-1200 **by October 12, 2009**. The Parents Office is located in Schine Student Center, Suite 228EFG.

Finally, **late registration will take place in person on October 23 or 24** at the Parents' Place Hospitality Suite, 304 Schine Student Center. There is a fee of \$20 for returned checks.

## **How do I know that you received my registration?**

**Please await the arrival of a confirmation postcard if you register before October 12.** The time leading up to Family Weekend is very busy for our staff, so the fewer phone calls we receive to check on registration status, the better we are able to serve you. If you register before October 12 and do not receive a postcard, please come to the Parents' Place Hospitality Suite, Panasci Lounge, Schine Student Center, and we will be happy to assist you.

## **What if I don't register by October 12?**

After October 12, please register in person at the Parents' Place Hospitality Suite.

## **If I have a Family Weekend parking pass, where do I park?**

The Family Weekend parking pass will allow you to park in any campus lot with an orange sign on **Friday after 5 p.m. and all day on Sunday**, and at the **Skytop lot on South Campus throughout the day on Saturday and before 5 p.m. on Friday**. Please move your car from South Campus (Skytop) to North Campus no later than 10 p.m. on Saturday.

Shuttle buses will run continuously from the Skytop lot at South Campus from noon to 6 p.m. on Friday and from 7:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Saturday. There will be no shuttle service on Sunday.

## **Directions to Skytop Parking Lot**

**From the North:** Interstate 81 South to Exit 17 (Brighton Avenue). Left at bottom of ramp, staying in left lane. Left at first light (East Brighton Avenue). Left onto Ainsley Drive. Right at end of road (Jamesville Avenue). Follow Jamesville Avenue directly to Skytop parking lot.

**From the South:** Interstate 81 North to 481 North. 481N to first exit (Rock Cut Road). Right off ramp to first traffic light. Right at light (East Brighton Avenue). Right at second traffic light (Ainsley Drive). At end of road, turn right (Jamesville Avenue). Follow Jamesville Avenue directly to Skytop parking lot.

**From Campus:** Go south on Comstock Avenue to Colvin Street. Turn left onto Colvin and take your first right onto Skytop Road (into South Campus). Follow Skytop Road all the way to the top and you will find the parking lot.

Cancellations with refunds are permitted through October 19. No refunds will be issued after this date.

The Connective Corridor is a community-wide effort to link the vast array of arts and cultural happenings, businesses, and neighborhoods in the City of Syracuse. Both an urban design project and collaborative initiative, the Connective Corridor will promote the diverse cultural and economic assets that Syracuse has to offer. The Connective Corridor will enhance Syracuse's distinctive character, strengthening social interaction among its people, improving ease of movement, and promoting new investment in the city.

Cultural collaborations are under way to strengthen relationships among institutions and expand opportunities for artists, residents, and visitors to Syracuse. With three major universities and more than 20 cultural venues within one mile of each other, there is something for everyone to enjoy in the city. The Connective Corridor's cultural venues offer an eclectic mix of modern and classical art, theater performances, and music.
